For over 40 years, the green and white silks of George Strawbridge, Jr.'s Augustin Stables have been worn on steeplechase and flat racers, including 1994 Breeders' Cup Turf champion Tikkanen and 2008 Filly and Mare Turf champion Forever Together. Augustin Stables is the all time leading steeplechase owner in North America, and is currently ninth among flat owners in 2011. Much of the stable's success has come from the long term relationship between Strawbridge and trainer Jonathan Sheppard. Strawbridge, a philanthropist, historian, investor and educator, currently resides with his wife, Nina in Cochranville, PA.



STANLEY I. JOSELSON

Stanley Joselson loved horseracing from the time he drew the "short straw" and had to buy out his friends when they all lost their money in a racing partnership. He went on to start Josco Farm in Pennington, NJ and began successfully breeding his own horses, many named after family and friends. Cheating Arthur, named for a card playing acquaintance and ridden regularly by Rick Wilson, was a Philadelphia Park fan favorite, as was homebred Clocks Secret, who won the Gr.III Prioress S. and Gr.III Genuine Risk S. His stallion, Two Davids, was named for his son. Joselson lived in Bala Cynwd, PA and gave up the business in 1987, and passed away in 2010.



SOMEDAY FARM

Roy and Pat Chapman

Roy and Pat Chapman began breeding horses in the late 1980's. Roy, who passed away in 2006, was a car salesman and owner of Chapman Auto Group in Philadelphia, while Patricia, his wife, is a former social worker.

Their most successful runner, until Three-Year-Old Champion Smarty Jones, was his dam, I'll Get Along, a winner of 12 races and over \$280,000, who they bred to Elusive Quality, upon the advice of their former trainer, Bob Camac. After Camac's death, they sold all but two of their horses, one of which was Smarty. Their Someday Farm is located in New Hope, PA.
