ROBERT W. GREEN

Chairman of the Board, Greenwood Racing

British gaming entrepreneurs Bob Green and William Hogwood purchased Philadelphia Park from ITB in 1990, forming Greenwood Racing, Inc. As Chairman of Greenwood, Green soon added full card simulcasting and six off-track Turf Clubs, and eventually joined Penn National Gaming which purchased Freehold Raceway and leased Garden State Park.

Green is also credited with creating telephone and internet wagering applications. Through his efforts in the last 10 years helping to create legislation for expanded wagering, Act 71 made way for slot machines and table games at the state's racetracks. Under the "parx" banner, he was instrumental in building the largest gaming and racing operation in Pennsylvania.

Turf Writer

Donnelly inherited the racing bug from his father, racing writer and Chicago racing steward, Russ Harris, who'd take him to the Hialeah backstretch as a young child. As a teenager, the allure of getting paid to pick winners prompted Donnelly to take up professional handicapping. Following in his dad's footsteps as a writer at the Miami Beach Sun, he was encouraged to change his last name so there'd be no

show of favoritism when he was hired. He and his father, now 88 years old, own horses together under the name Silver Lake Stable. Their first homebred, Ann's Smart Dancer, is a multiple PA-bred stakes winner. One of his sons, Jeffrey, is a trainer at Penn National. Donnelly currently calls charts for Equibase.

Track Announcer, Parx Racing

Keith Jones has been manning the announcer's booth since 1987 and has seen the track through all of its' changes as Keystone, Philadelphia Park and Parx Racing. As track announcer and host of the PTHA's Let's Go Racing, he is both the face and voice of the track. Jones loves the competition aspect of Thoroughbred racing, and as a child, watched all of the Triple Crown races with his father. It was a winning trifecta ticket at

Brandywine Harness track after college graduation, however, that propelled him into his first job in the industry at Garden State Park in the publicity department. He lives in Newtown, PA and is the father of Colin, 21 and Jamie, 26.
